Celebrating Reader Ministry at Wells Cathedral

It was a joy-filled day as Readers from across the diocese gathered in Wells for the Annual Readers' Day. Seven new Readers were commissioned at the cathedral, and four were welcomed to the diocese, surrounded by the love, prayers, and support of their families, friends, and parish communities.

The day was also a time for all Readers in Bath and Wells to reaffirm their commitment to serve God through their ministry. Speaking after the service Simon Hill, Warden of Readers and Archdeacon of Taunton, said, "Readers play a vital part in church and community life across Somerset and are a key part of shared local ministry. Anti Slavery Day art exhibition

From 17-19 October, Hidden Voices Bridgwater is hosting an art exhibition in St. Mary's Church, Bridgwater focusing on the hidden slavery in everyday products and services. Called The Hidden Market the exhibition aims to explore the realities of modern slavery and human trafficking. All the works have been produced by local artists. Sian Owen of Hidden Voices Bridgwater explains, "We think it is a powerful way to bring home to people the reality of modern slavery and the way in which slavery can exist in the supply chains of many products and services we readily enjoy." The group has also paid for an illuminated road sign on the A38 to raise awareness of modern slavery. If you are organising an Anti-Slavery Day church service this month check out the Clewer

Remembrance at Wells Cathedral

In the 80th anniversary year of the end of the Second World War, Wells Cathedral is holding a series of events to mark this special occasion. As part of the Cathedral's Living Liberty project, the Tapestry of Black Britons is coming to Wells this November and will form part of the Remembrance activities.

The Tapestry of Black Britons honours Black British, Caribbean, African, and Asian contributions to WWII. Inspired by the Bayeux Tapestry and African traditions, this evolving artwork by Paula Ogun Hector highlights 2,000 years of Black presence in Britain. A special preview with the artist <u>takes place on Friday 4 November.</u>
