Bishop Michael writes to MPs ahead of third reading of assisted dying bill

Ahead of the Terminally III Adults (End of Life) Bill debate in Parliament on Friday (16 May 2025), Bishop Michael has written to MPs serving communities across Bath and Wells, assuring them, and all our MPs, of his prayers as they prepare to debate this "complex and difficult issue" and his continued opposition to the proposals.

He says, "Since the Bill received its second reading back in November, there has been much development of its original proposals and much more information has been made available about its likely impact."

Bishop Michael remains concerned about the proposed safeguards, saying "the Bill's original proposals have quickly been diluted". He also draws attention to the impact that the legislation will have on the vulnerable and the NHS. <u>Read more.</u>

Naturally, I am hoping that the next Bishop of Taunton, like the previous one, will have a passion for caring for the environment. I also think it is important that our next bishop is able to engage with younger people and those of all faiths and none, so I am pleased to be in a position to bring that perspective to the table, and I think it says a lot about the diocese that has invited me to do so."



Bishop Michael visits Zambia

Bishop Michael's return visit to Zambia last week proved an invaluable opportunity to talk about the future of the Zambia Bath and Wells link. Speaking about his trip, Bishop Michael said, "This year's visit was much more focused on moving forward with aspects of our life together, and where we can support each other within the link."

Parish Safeguarding Officers celebration evening

Parish Safeguarding Officers from across the diocese joined Bishop Michael for Evensong at the cathedral followed by refreshments at the Bishop's Palace this week. This is the first of a series of events planned for the summer to thank all our Parish Safeguarding Officers for everything they do to support safeguarding across our diocese.

David Niven, who heads the Diocesan Safeguarding Advisory Panel (DSAP), the body of volunteers who oversee safeguarding work in the diocese, attended the event. He said, "This is a lovely opportunity for Parish Safeguarding Officers to be recognised and I hope realise how vital they are to the fabric of safeguarding in the diocese. The greatest of respect should be given to these vital volunteers, we are so lucky to have so many good ones."

David, like many members of the Diocesan Safeguarding Advisory Panel, has extensive experience of safeguarding, having worked nationally and internationally in the field of social welfare. He hosts <u>the Social World podcast</u>, interviewing experts from the field. A simple daily guide offers prayer prompts alongside a written prayer and Bible verse which can be used by individuals and small groups, or to inspire prayers for church services and collective worship.

Biddisham's tower bells will be carefully removed for essential repairs this June. The bells were made by a famous bell founder who also made 'one offs' for places like Westminster Abbey. The 19th century bell frame will be mended, and the bells, last rehung in the 1870's, will be restored and returned. Before they go back up everyone is invited to view them on 5 June from 18:00 -19:00.

The Go Team's invitation encouraged people right across the diocese to take part as we reflected together each day throughout Lent on our journey towards Easter.

Revd Lis Sparrow from St John's Church, Bridgwater said, "The Lent Cross Challenge was taken on by young and not so young, by mobile folk and not so mobile folk. By posting on Facebook each day it was great to find out what others had seen. It was a challenge but also fun and made you look more closely at your surroundings and yourself."

Sea Sunday on 13 July

is a time for churches to pray for and think about the men and women who work at sea, far from home. At Royal Portbury and Avonmouth Docks, Bristol, chaplains from the Mission to Seafarers including Revd Lucy Blows and Fr Jeremy Hellier, along with their ecumenical colleagues and volunteers, provide practical help and a compassionate presence to crews from around the globe.

From praying together and providing warm clothing to simply asking, "How are you?", their ministry offers comfort and connection. Many seafarers have limited time ashore, so chaplains will bring supplies directly to ships. Sometimes a small gesture, like a prayer card, can deeply move someone who feels forgotten.

Fr Jeremy reminds us that around 95% of everything we use comes by sea, which means the welfare of seafarers has a strong link to our own lives.

Caroline Bruce, Deanery Accompanier for Axbridge Deanery, said, "There was something about making something together that brought us a bit closer, it was about remembering God's creativity and being encouraged to join in with it and remembering the power of putting God into everything... that made our morning transformative."
