### A Christmas message from Bishop Michael



In this year's Christmas message, Bishop Michael visits St Paul's Church of England Junior School in Shepton Mallet, where he spoke with children about the meaning of Christmas.

Reflecting on the carol Silent Night, Bishop Michael explores its message: "All is calm, all is bright." He asks 'was it really calm and bright for Mary and Joseph on that first Christmas?' Bishop Michael discusses how Jesus was born into chaos, stress, and uncertainty - a world much like ours today - and reminds us that even in the storms and darkness of life, Jesus is God with us, bringing His peace and light to the world.

## 'In the Bleak Mid-Winter'

Christmas is not always a happy time for everyone. Sally Walters, Wellbeing Adviser for Bath and Wells reflects on what for some people can be a difficult time of year.

"In the hustle and bustle of Christmas preparation and anticipation of comfort and joy, many feel considerable stress at the thought of hosting, being together with family members, cooking, let alone buying the perfect present.

"Depression can start in the winter despite opportunities to snuggle down and keep warm. The weather can have a direct influence on people's mental state, as can the darkness of loneliness, feeling overwhelmed and under pressure. Grief and despair can surface causing isolation, especially when it is thought that others are having fun.

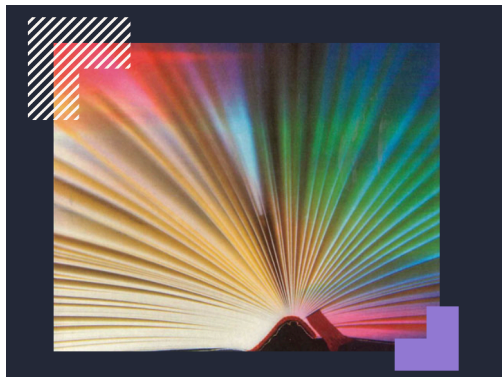
"We need to recognise warning signs, and open up conversations that can be the first step to finding paths to seek help."

## 12 December 2024 - Christmas Blog

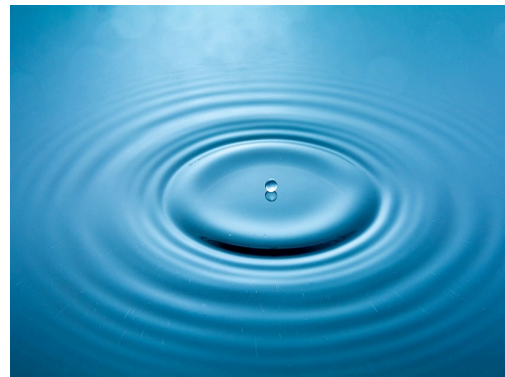

## An environmentally friendly Christmas

At St John the Evangelist Church, Highbridge, they've been doing all they can to reduce and limit their waste. For Christingle this year they decided to change things and cut down on the waste usually left in pews after the Christingle service. So, they introduced the almost fully edible Christingle - even the candle was made of chocolate!

The team at St John's hosted an angel themed family service emphasising angels as God's messengers. During this service, and the following Sunday service, everyone was invited to write prayers on scrolls, which were placed inside used plastic milk bottles. These bottles were then crafted into a large pair of angel wings symbolising a 'message in a bottle' to God. Each bottle also lights up.

The wings are now on display inside the church, which is open everyday 10am - 4pm where visitors are invited to 'grab a halo and strike a pose' for a photo with them.

The service brought members of the farming community, the local churches and many more to the market to celebrate together with those in the community. Joining them were the Exmoor Hill Farming Network (EHFN), the Farming Community Network (FCN) and Revd David Weir, Rector, Exmoor (Benefice). Bishop Michael was invited to preach at the service.

Readings were given by local farmers and representatives of Exmoor Farmers Livestock Auctions and the Exmoor Rural Health Hub. Afterwards everyone was treated to a complimentary beef stew.

Revd David said, "This is a lovely opportunity to gather here in a different way and celebrate all the life that gathers round the market."

Speaking afterwards Bishop Michael said, "It's been wonderful to be together and to celebrate the life of the community."



## Bringing the Christmas story to life on the farm

Four farms around our diocese have played host to Journey to Bethlehem, an interactive retelling of the Christmas story for younger primary aged children. In each location, churches worked with farmers to welcome school groups onto the farm, bringing the story of Jesus' birth to life.

Groups of children and staff were met from their coach by shepherds who told of an angel visitation and invited them to join them on their journey to Bethlehem to find out more about the 'good news' they'd heard. Meeting a variety of farm animals along the way, each group had to stop and register at the Roman census point, encountered tax collectors and a grumpy inn keeper before discovering Mary and Joseph and their baby in a stable. The service was led by Revd Tobie Osmond, Vicar of Taunton Minster, and was attended by Bishop Michael, who concluded the event with a blessing. The choir of Trull Church of England VA Primary School had the special honour of performing Christmas hymns.

The 'Together at Christmas' service mirrored the carol service hosted by The Princess of Wales in Westminster Abbey, which emphasised the importance of supporting those experiencing hardship.

"Light of the Stars", an installation by Andy Jupp (who exhibits with the British Council and Arts Council) is his response to conversations with Stephen Girling, the former Abbey Missioner, on the subject of contemplative prayer.

The light installation, crafted by the artisans at [Paper Starlights](#), is described as "Celebrating love, light, and the beauty of community, all under the universal theme 'Under the Same Sky of Stars.'"

"Designed to complement the Abbey's 17th-century stained-glass windows, the installation creates a striking contrast between traditional architecture and contemporary art.
