#### Initial conversations

This is a first step in response to thinking about if God is calling someone into ministry. This may follow a nudge from another minister, a home group leader, a youth group leader or a friend at church.

#### Discernment

A particular ministry may be obvious, but it may be helpful to have a discussion with someone from the diocesan vocations team. Once a specific ministry is identified, the participant discusses an appropriate pathway with their incumbent using the ministry checklist. The incumbent may delegate this task to another experienced minister, (Lay or ordained) who may become a local mentor.



### **Equipping pathways**



#### Mentoring

An experienced person is identified to work alongside the participant offering support through training and in their first steps of ministry.

Training is available for

those called to be

mentors.

#### Course pathway

A full course may be delivered locally or facilitated by the diocesan training team, in person or online, using the diocesan resource.

#### Sessions pathway

For participants with previous experience, particular sessions are identified from the relevant course.

#### Apprenticeship pathway

The participant works alongside an experienced person. Participants may also access sessions from the relevant resource.

The emphasis is on the practical.

#### Discernment review

Using the ministry checklist, the mentor or incumbent meets with the participant to talk through their development. Once a participant feels confident, PCC agreement is obtained. Appropriate safeguarding checks and training are completed. The application is sent to the Training Team for processing. A certificate of commendation is sent back to the applicant.



#### Commissioning

Ministry is publicly recognised at a parish, deanery or diocesan event.

# A vision for ministry

All people are created by God and called to be involved in God's mission and ministry. Through our baptism, we are called to shine as lights in the world. Shared local ministry provides a framework to explore a wide variety of ministry roles in the local church and community shared between clergy and lay ministers, that fits the local context.

# The ministry pathway

The pathway opposite takes an individual on a journey from an initial nudge to living out and developing a ministry in their community.

Full guidance notes explaining each step are provided in the resource pack from training@bathwells.anglican.org and on the diocesan website.

The checklist indicates gifts and skills needed to exercise a particular ministry.

The requirements are supported by course materials, which may be delivered as a full course or accessed for individual sessions under the guidance of a local mentor, often the incumbent or another member of the local team.

PCC approval for ministry is required, along with the completed checklist, a DBS and the appropriate level of safeguarding training. This ensures as a church we maintain a high level of accountability and exercise our ministry in as safe a way as we can.

The individual will receive a commendation from the Bishop and will be welcomed at a local commissioning service.
