

Job applicant privacy notice

The Bath & Wells Diocesan Board of Finance (hereafter known as the DBF) is aware of its obligations under the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) and is committed to processing your data securely and transparently. This privacy notice sets out, in line with GDPR, the types of data that we collect and hold on you as a job applicant. It also sets out how we use that information, how long we keep it for and other relevant information about your data.

Data controller details

The DBF is a data controller, meaning that it determines the processes to be used when using your personal data. Our contact details are as follows:

Data protection principles

In relation to your personal data, we will:

- process it fairly, lawfully and in a clear, transparent way,
- collect your data only for reasons that we find proper for the course of your employment in ways that have been explained to you,
- only use it in the way that we have told you about,
- ensure it is correct and up to date,
- keep your data for only as long as we need it,
- process it in a way that ensures it will not be used for anything that you are not aware of or have consented to (as appropriate), lost or destroyed.

Types of data we process

We hold many types of data about you, which depending on the role you apply for may include:

- your personal details including your name, address, date of birth, email address, phone numbers,
- gender,
- marital status,
- whether or not you have a disability,
- information included on your application form/CV including references, education history and employment history,
- documentation relating to your right to work in the UK,
- driving licence,
- information relating to your criminal record,
- records of qualifications.

How we collect your data

We collect data about you in a variety of ways including the information you would normally include in an application form, CV, job application cover letter, or notes made by our recruiting officers during an interview. Further information will be collected directly from you if you commence employment, for example, your bank and next of kin details. Other details may be collected directly from you in the form of official documentation such as your driving licence, passport or other right to work evidence.

In some cases, we will collect data about you from third parties, such as employment agencies or former employers when gathering references or credit reference agencies. Personal data is kept in personnel files or within the DBF's HR and IT systems.

Why we process your data

The law on data protection allows us to process your data for certain reasons only:

- in order to perform the employment contract that we are party to,
- in order to carry out legally required duties,
- in order for us to carry out our legitimate interests,
- to protect your interests, and
- where something is done in the public interest.

All of the processing carried out by us falls into one of the permitted reasons. Generally, we will rely on the first three reasons set out above to process your data.

We need to collect your data to ensure we are complying with legal requirements such as:

- carrying out checks in relation to your right to work in the UK and
- making reasonable adjustments for disabled employees.

We also collect data so that we can carry out activities which are in the legitimate interests of the DBF. We have set these out below:

- making decisions about who to offer employment to,
- making decisions about salary and other benefits,
- assessing training needs,
- dealing with legal claims made against us.

If you are unsuccessful in obtaining employment, your data will not be used for any reason other than in the ways explained in relation to the specific application you have made.

Special categories of data

Special categories of data are data relating to your health, sexual orientation, race, ethnic origin, political opinion, religion, trade union membership and genetic and biometric data.

We must process special categories of data in accordance with more stringent guidelines. Most commonly, we will process special categories of data when the following applies:

- you have given explicit consent to the processing,
- we must process the data in order to carry out our legal obligations,
- we must process data for reasons of substantial public interest,
- you have already made the data public.

We will use your special category data for the purposes of equal opportunities monitoring or to make reasonable adjustments during the interview process where required.

We do not need your consent if we use special categories of personal data in order to carry out our legal obligations or exercise specific rights under employment law. However, we may ask for your consent to allow us to process certain particularly sensitive data. If this occurs, you will be made fully aware of the reasons for the processing. As with all cases of seeking consent from you, you will have full control over your decision to give or withhold consent and there will be no consequences where consent is withheld. Consent, once given, may be withdrawn at any time. There will be no consequences where consent is withdrawn.

Criminal conviction data

We will only collect criminal conviction data where it is appropriate given the nature of your role and where the law permits us. This data will usually be collected at the recruitment stage, however, it may also be collected during your employment should you be successful in obtaining employment. We use criminal conviction data in the following ways:

- to determine individual suitability for the role, including any necessary adjustments,
- to comply with the Church of England's safeguarding and safer recruitment policies.

We rely on the following lawful basis to process this data.

- in order to perform the employment contract that we are party to,
- in order to carry out legally required duties,
- in order for us to carry out our legitimate interests,
- to protect your interests, and
- in the public interest.

If you do not provide your data to us

One of the reasons for processing your data is to allow us to carry out an effective recruitment process. Whilst you are under no obligation to provide us with your data, we may not able to process, or continue with (as appropriate), your application without it.

Sharing your data

Your data will be shared with colleagues within the DBF where it is necessary for them to undertake their duties with regard to recruitment. This includes, for example, the HR department, the Archdeacon's office for parochial vacancies, those involved in the interview panel who are responsible for screening your application and interviewing you.

In some cases, we will collect data about you from third parties, such as employment agencies.

Your data will be shared with third parties if you are successful in your job application. In these circumstances, we will share your data in order to obtain references as part of the recruitment process, obtain a criminal records check (if required), and obtain fitness for work certification from our occupational health provider.

We do not share your data with bodies outside of the European Economic Area.

Protecting your data

We are aware of the requirement to ensure your data is protected against accidental loss or disclosure, destruction and abuse. We have implemented processes to guard against such.

Where we share your data with third parties, we ensure that appropriate systems are in place to ensure that your data is held securely and in line with GDPR requirements. Third parties must implement appropriate technical and organisational measures to ensure the security of your data.

How long we keep your data for

In line with data protection principles, we only keep your data for as long as we need it for and this will depend on whether or not you are successful in obtaining employment with us.

If your application is not successful we will keep your data for six months once the recruitment exercise ends.

If your application is successful, your data will be kept and transferred to the systems we administer for employees. We have a separate privacy notice for employees, which will be provided to you.

Automated decision-making

No decision will be made about you solely on the basis of automated decision-making (where a decision is taken about you using an electronic system without human involvement) which has a significant impact on you.

Your rights in relation to your data

The law on data protection gives you certain rights in relation to the data we hold on you. These are:

- the right to be informed. This means that we must tell you how we use your data, and this is the purpose of this privacy notice,
- the right of access. You have the right to access the data that we hold on you. To do so, you should make a subject access request,
- the right for any inaccuracies to be corrected. If any data that we hold about you is incomplete or inaccurate, you are able to require us to correct it,
- the right to have information deleted. If you would like us to stop processing your data, you have the right to ask us to delete it from our systems where you believe there is no reason for us to continue processing it,
- the right to restrict the processing of the data. For example, if you believe the data
 we hold is incorrect, we will stop processing the data (whilst still holding it) until we
 have ensured that the data is correct,

- the right to portability. You may transfer the data that we hold on you for your own purposes,
- the right to object to the inclusion of any information. You have the right to object to the way we use your data where we are using it for our legitimate interests,
- the right to regulate any automated decision-making and profiling of personal data. You have a right not to be subject to automated decision making in way that adversely affects your legal rights.

Where you have provided consent to our use of your data, you also have the unrestricted right to withdraw that consent at any time. Withdrawing your consent means that we will stop processing the data that you had previously given us consent to use. There will be no consequences for withdrawing your consent. However, in some cases, we may continue to use the data where so permitted by having a legitimate reason for doing so.

Making a complaint

The supervisory authority in the UK for data protection matters is the Information Commissioner (ICO). If you think your data protection rights have been breached in any way by us, you are able to make a complaint to the ICO.
